Planting seeds of change at Muwaya



On February 26 and 27 February 2025, our CMO team visited Muwaya Primary School near the Handyman's Lime plant in Ndola, Zambia. This visit provided a wonderful opportunity to engage with the children about the importance of trees, plant 40 saplings, and explain the meaning and value of sustainability.

The first day began with an interactive session about trees. The children's initial shyness quickly disappeared when they realized that answering questions from our colleagues earned them prizes. Hands shot up eagerly as they participated in the discussion.



Following the talk, we moved outside to plant saplings. It was a hands-on experience as we got our hands dirty, settling each plant into its new home. The children brought bottles and jugs from home to water the new trees, showing their enthusiasm and commitment.

The next day, we returned to teach the older children about sustainability and their role in protecting the environment for future generations. Before the classroom session, the school's cultural society delighted us with a performance of singing, dancing, prepared speeches, and even a poem recital.
